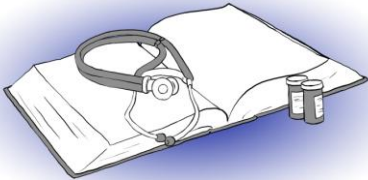

Competition Introduction

2011 National Meeting Clinical Skills Competition

The Student National Pharmaceutical Association's (SNPhA) Clinical Skills Competitions are an educational opportunity for SNPhA students from chapters across the nation to display their pharmaceutical knowledge, patient assessment skills, clinical presentation abilities and effective patient counseling. The clinical competitions will be performed in pairs with each student team given a case scenario to analyze and identify pharmacy related issues and to present an appropriate pharmaceutical care plan.

The 2011 Clinical Skills Competition is being expanded to include a patient counseling session in addition to case evaluation and presentation at the National Meeting. Pharmacy graduates today have many diverse career paths, each utilizing different strengths and qualities of pharmacy practice. The traditional clinical skills and patient counseling competition combines clinical knowledge and skill sets into one competition. The purpose of the competition is to streamline and apply proficiencies in these clinical areas.

The National Clinical Skills Competition will be performed in pairs with each student team given a patient's medication profile to evaluate, provide appropriate assessment and drug therapy and conduct appropriate counseling. Pharmacy students who have completed their first year will be required to register with an upper classman currently in their third or fourth year in pharmacy school. Recent graduates or licensed pharmacist are not eligible to compete in the National Clinical Skills Competition. There is a maximum number of slots available for teams to participate at the National Meeting and will be assigned on a first come, first serve basis. Schools that register first will be provided a slot to compete. Remaining teams will be placed on a waiting list and notified if a slot becomes available.

Components of the National Clinical Skills Competition

Orientation

Participants will be instructed on procedures of the competition, introduced to the structure of the competition, and will be allowed to ask questions during the orientation session. Attendance at this session is mandatory for participants.

Preliminary Round *All teams will participate*

Case Analysis: Participants will be presented with a clinical case and are required to analyze patient information and current drug therapy. Participants will prioritize drug therapy problems, identify interventions and therapeutic recommendations, and develop a pharmaceutical care plan. Participants will have 2 hours to analyze the case and complete the pharmaceutical care plan. Participants will be allowed to utilize resources to prepare for the preliminary round.

Final Round *Top 3 teams will participate based on judging of pharmaceutical care plans*

Case Presentation: Participants will have 5 minutes to present their case to the panel of judges. The 5 minute presentation should include:

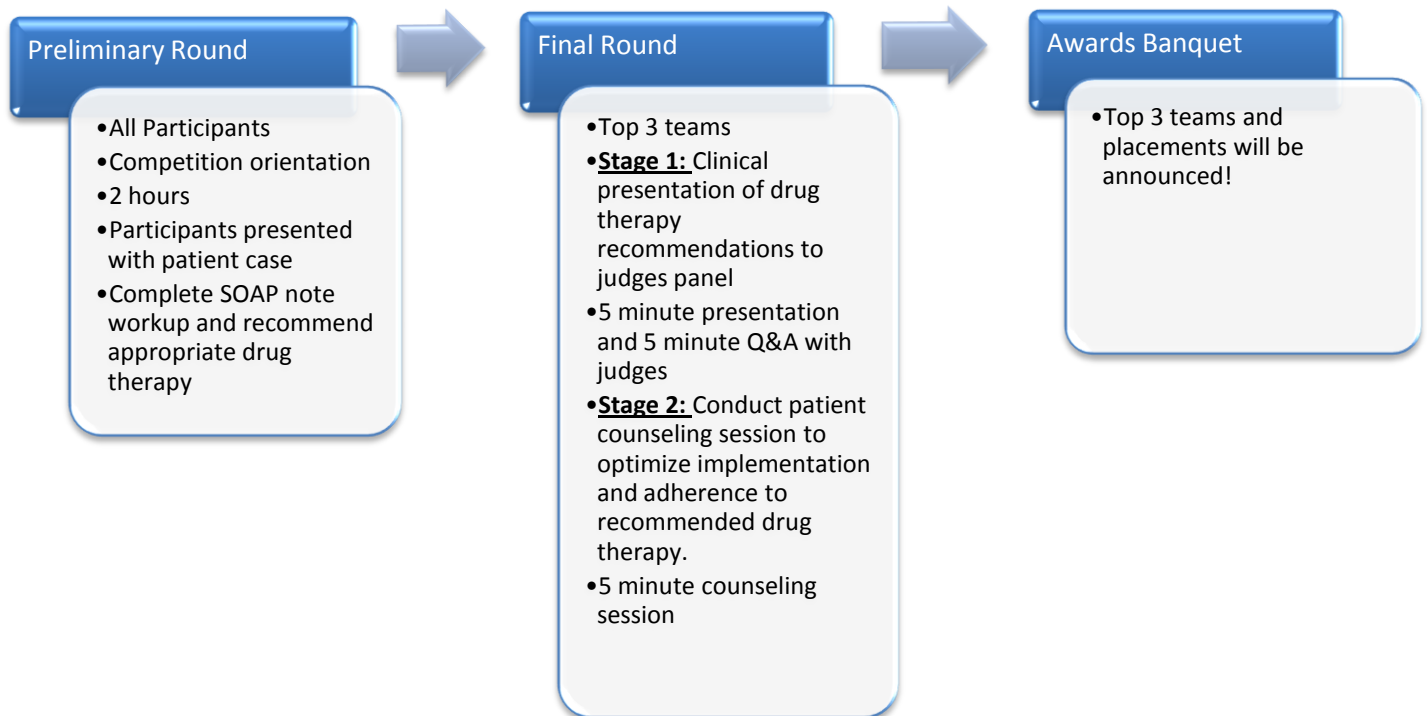
- Introduction (Team Number)
- Summary of the patient including health problems
- Detailed recommendations for the patient's most urgent problem(s)

Participants will then have a 5 minutes question and answer session with the panel of judges.



Patient Counseling Session: Participants will then have approximately 5 minutes to conduct a patient counseling session on the patient's recommended medication regimen. The participants should counsel the patient to optimize patient understanding, adherence, and outcomes. The patient may display personality characteristics to challenge the participants' ability to convey pertinent therapy information.

General Competition Information

Resources:

Students are allowed to bring resources to use during the development of the pharmaceutical care plan. SNPhA will have a limited number of resources available for students to use. Electronic resources, class notes, and cheat sheets will not be allowed. Resources are subject to approval by the Competition Coordinator. A list of pre-approved resources can be found in Appendix A and the national website (www.snpha.org).

Judging:

Judges will evaluate the pharmaceutical care plan according to the criteria listed in the guidelines. The judging of the final round will consist of at least a three-judge panel. Judges will evaluate and score each team on the interaction and information presented during their clinical case presentation and patient counseling session. Participant's school affiliation will not be known to judges.

Attire:

Students will be expected to dress professionally during the competition. White lab coats are **MANDATORY** during the competition. Students will be required to supply their own lab coats.

Eligibility:

1. Participants must be current SNPhA members.
2. Participants must be enrolled in a full-time Doctor of Pharmacy Program.
3. First year pharmacy students may participate but are required to partner with a student that has completed their second or third year.
4. Must not be licensed to practice pharmacy or be a recent graduate from a pharmacy program.
5. The orientation and preliminary competition will be held on the Friday afternoon of the National Meeting. The final round will be held on Saturday. Teams must be present for the National Clinical Skills Competition Orientation or will forfeit their participation.



Rules:

- Student must meet eligibility requirements
- Chapters are allowed to enter up to a maximum of TWO team(s) composed of two members per team in the competition. National Meeting participation will be limited to availability on a first come, first serve basis.
- Students are required to dress professionally and wear their white lab coats.
- Students are not to discuss the case with others except their teammate.
- Judges decisions are final and are not subject to appeal
- Students are only to use pre-approved references found in Appendix A. Participants may use resources not found in Appendix A if approved by the Competition Coordinator.
- Must submit team registration form to the National Vice President, Juan Lopez (juanlopez@snpha.org) by **July 8th, 2011**.
- **Must attend mandatory competition orientation on Friday, July 22nd, 2011 from 12:00 – 12:30pm.**



Outcomes Measured in the Competition

- **Problem Solving Skills:** Clinical thinking is essential in the management of patients in healthcare. Students' ability to systematically think through problems will be graded for consistency and therapeutic knowledge.
- **Communication:** Communication is essential to the pharmacist in providing a continuum of care between healthcare professionals and patients. It empowers the pharmacist to help patients have a fundamental understanding of how to take their medications and to avoid adverse reactions. Students will be expected to display effective written and verbal communication skills.
- **Therapeutic Knowledge/Management:** Medication therapy management is a daily expectation of pharmacists. Management and adjustment of medication therapy will be graded on purpose and benefit. Students will be expected to provide evidence-based medicine while identifying and prioritizing drug therapy and problems.
- **Pharmaceutical Care Plan:** Development of a pharmaceutical care plan is required not only to document current regimen, but also to provide an outline of the goal of therapy for the patient. Each student team is expected to develop a written pharmaceutical care plan that will be evaluated for: completeness, therapy's benefit to the patient, design and the implementation of evidence based medicine guidelines.
- **Counseling Session:** Drug education and counseling give patients information about their regimen and how to take their medication(s). Students will be expected to provide drug education to the patient in a manner that the patient can understand and use to benefit their therapy.



Evaluation of Patient Counseling Teams

General Rubric for Pharmaceutical Care Plan:

Problem Identification and Prioritization

- Identification of the most urgent issue
- Patient conditions are identified based on evidence based medicine
- Patient issues are properly prioritized

Therapeutic Goals

- Goals are patient specific, relevant to the needs of the patient, and attainable

Drug Therapy Recommendations

- Recommendations are patient specific, appropriate, and predicated on evidence-based medicine

Monitoring Parameters

- Monitoring parameters and intervals are appropriate to patient problems and drug therapy

General Rubric for Clinical Presentation:

Presentation Skills

- Verbal and non-verbal communication
- Completed within the allotted 5 minute time interval

Drug Therapy Comprehension

- Comprehension of drug therapy recommended and appropriateness

Clinical Judgment

- Problem-solving and decision-making skills
- Ability to defend clinical judgment of recommended therapy with evidence based practice



General Rubric for Patient Counseling Session:

Patient Interaction

- Systematically thinks through problems and present medication information in a logical order
- Displays confidence and the ability to control and direct the counseling session
- Manages time effectively
- Efficient teamwork

Communication Skills

- Displays effective verbal and nonverbal communication skills
- Uses an interactive approach to assessing and verifying patient understanding through the use of open-ended questions
- Uses language the patient will be able to understand
- Demonstrates effective counseling techniques

Professional Knowledge

- Provides drug education to the patient in a manner that the patient can understand and use to benefit their therapy
- Conveys accurate information including but not limited to: medication, indication, dosage, form, route, duration, pertinent side effects, precautions, interactions, missed dose procedures, storage recommendations, and specific techniques for self monitoring
- Discusses any potential therapeutic problems
- Recognizes compliance problems and increase adherence

Appendix B: Clinical Skills Competition Grant Guidelines

The 2011 Clinical Skills Competition first place team will earn their school a \$500 grant, courtesy of the Kroger Co., to implement or expand on a clinical skills program at their school or college of pharmacy. The grant will allow SNPhA members to expand their clinical knowledge and practice clinical skills. The winning team's chapter is free to finance this project in any way they see fit as long as they follow the established guideline below.

The chapter should maintain records on how the funds are used after disbursement. The chapter will be expected to provide a presentation at the orientation for the 2012 National Meeting's Clinical Skills Competition. The 10 - 15 minute presentation should include the following:

- A detailed explanation of how the grant was used in an effort to expand or implement a clinical skills program at the chapter's school.
- A reflection of the chapter's experience with the implementation of this project.
- Photos of the chapter participating in the program.
- Copies of materials used in the program including promotional materials, competition and practice cases, educational materials, and other documentation the chapter wishes to showcase.
- Those individuals presenting may use any format they would like. If special equipment is needed (i.e. projector, powerpoint, flipchart, etc.) the competition coordinator must be contacted by May 1st, 2012.

Supporting materials for the 2011 Clinical Skills Program Grant are due no later than May 1st to the current National Vice-President for presentation to the Kroger Co. and SNPhA membership.
